Introduction

What is provided for you here is a simple prayer and scripture guide, adapted from the Book of Common Prayer and Common Worship, that covers the duration of the Lenten season. It is meant to be used individually or within your house church, family, and friends for the purpose of prayer, meditation, and reflection. You will also find these themes and some of these scriptures and prayers mirrored in our Lenten gatherings.

Lent is the oldest season of the church, and I believe the most gracious season, as the church presses upon us the need for penitence, fasting, and prayer -- ancient practices of the faithful. In penitence we examine our hearts, discovering ways in which we have drifted from the beauty of God, for ways in which we have hurt ourselves and others, and we seek to turn from these beliefs and actions. Through fasting, we make space within ourselves to become attentive again to that hunger within us to know our creator. In prayer, we open ourselves up to the transcendent, allowing our hearts be drawn into God, through the Spirit.

These practices serve to give space for the opening up of ourselves to the presence of God, who surrounds us and longs to make his home within us. This Lent, my prayer for you is that you would know Christ as he really, really is. May you find him in the silence, in the hunger, in the examination of your own heart. As I said on Sunday, I'm looking forward to a "holy boredom." I'm needing moments in my day when, free from the many distractions that I pour into my life, I can begin to give attention to that place in me that longs for something more.

Whatever this journey is for you, may it be full of life, moment by moment, as you open yourself up to the one who holds all things.

We have compiled a Lenten guide for our community. In it we have compiled the readings throughout Lent, as well as some resources that may be of help to you in your journey. We have also scheduled some times of prayer throughout the season that we hope may be good for you.

that they may inherit the kingdom of heaven
and see you face to face,
we pray to you, O Lord:
in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Let us commend the world, for which Christ suffered,
To the mercy and protection of God.

First Sunday in Lent

The Collect —

Almighty God, whose blessed Son was led by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan: come quickly to help us who are assaulted by many temptations; and, as you know the weaknesses of each of us, let each find you mighty to save.

Monday, March 2

The Collect —

Almighty and everlasting God, mercifully increase in us your gifts of holy discipline, in almsgiving, prayer, and fasting; that our lives may be directed to the fulfilling of your most gracious will; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever.

Psalm 19:7-14; Leviticus 19:1-2, 11-18; Matthew 25:31-46

Tuesday, March 3

The Collect —

Grant to your people, Lord, grace to withstand the temptations of the world, the flesh, and the evil one, and with pure hearts and minds to follow you, the only true God.

Readings —

Psalm 34:15-22; Isaiah 55:6-11; Matthew 6:7-15

Wednesday, March 4

The Collect —

Bless us, O God, in this holy season in which our hearts seek your help and healing, and so purify us by your disciplines that we may grow in grace and in knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever.

Amen.

Readings —

Psalm 51:11-18; Jonah 3:1-10; Luke 11:29-32

Thursday, March 5

The Collect —

Strengthen us, O Lord, by your grace,
that in your might we may overcome all spiritual enemies and with pure
hearts serve you.
